Student Leadership Amelia Varua (11) and Annie Lu (11) attended a Women's Leadership Conference at parliament House on Tuesday. Chelsea Valeutin (10) attended a three day Student Leadership Conference on Wednesday to Friday.

Minister's Award for Excellence in Student Achievement At the end of Term 3 I attended this award ceremony where Roy Chowdury was presented with his award by our new Director General, Dr Michele Bruniges.

LanguagePerfect World Championships 2011 We entered this competition for the first time to achieve our 12 Gold winners (top 1%), our 4 Silver winners (top 5%), our 8 Bronze winners (top 10%) and our 6 credits (top 20%). There were 80000 entries world wide. As a school we came second in the group of 500 schools with less than 50 entries, earning 72582 points and answering 157,311 questions. Congratulations to Kelly Wu who earned more than 26000 points all by herself! Our students who participated spent 619 online hours learning languages: French, Japanese, Chinese, German, Italian, Latin, Russian, Spanish, Maori and Indonesian. Twelve countries and 1000 schools participated. Overall, Australia came first, followed by New Zealand and the UK. Australia earned 7,318,052.

Australian Junior Table Tennis Championships Erny Tsao was selected to represent NSW in the U18 Boys Team competing in the Australian Junior Table Tennis Championships in Sydney from Sunday the 25^{th} of September to Saturday the 1^{st} of October 2011. Erny was the 2010 Table Tennis National Champion in U15 Boys Team, and awarded the U15 Boys Best Player

(National Tournament Order of Merit Number 1) in the 2010 National Junior Tournament. Therefore even though he is still 15 this year, he has been selected to the U18 Boys Team rather than his own age group.

Order of Australia Community Service Commendation Sanji Fernando has been awarded this commendation. The Order of Australia Association has this year awarded twenty-one 'Certificates of Commendation' for community service, the awardees being students in secondary schools in New South Wales. An inscribed medallion was presented by Her Excellency the Governor, Professor Marie Bashir AC CVO, at Government House on the 23rd November.

Strings/woodwind Blue Mountains tour This was a first for the school and was very successful in the last week of term 3. I received the following email from the principal of Mt Victoria PS:

Senior concert Band Tour The primary schools, the special school and the nursing home where the band performed, all praised the performances of our students. Each band tour has a strong agricultural component and this time in Orange, the students particularly enjoyed their orchard tour.

Pole vault gold medal Mudith Jayasekara won a Gold Medal for Pole Vault and became the NSW All Schools Champion for 15 Year Pole Vault at the All Schools Athletics Carnival over the weekend. In his 100m event he ran well in the heats and qualified first for the finals but came 5th in the finals. It was a very close finish among the first five runners. Mudith represented the NSW team for the Pole Vault at the National carnival in 3-4 December in Brisbane.

2011 Dorothea Mackellar Poetry Awards Yoshua Selvadurai (Yr 7) was awarded a 'Highly Commended' in the 2011 Dorothea Mackellar Poetry Awards. The Dorothea Mackellar poetry competition is one of Australia's largest and oldest school poetry competitions.

LAZSTA 2011 Space Academy and US Field Studies Tour I have had wonderful reports about the participation of Jason Chen and Michelle Wang on this tour, which included the Advanced Space Academy Program at the US Space and Rocket Centre, Huntsville, Alabama. Participants spent the week at space camp training with a team that flew simulated Space Shuttle missions to the International Space Station, conducted experiments and successfully simulated extra-vehicular activities. Jason and Michelle are to be congratulated for their commitment to team activities, leadership training and assisting others in completing the Space Academy course as well as the event throughout the tour.

JENESYS Programme 2011 Sydney Tang, Emily Hall, Elizabeth Chen and Clarence Ma have been selected to participate in the JENESYS programme to Japan from December 5th to 19th 2011. They have been chosen out of over 900 applications and will be great representatives of Australia as they make the most of this opportunity to visit Japan.

Greetings from the Farm

Late semester 2 sees us harvesting a bumper crop of **potatoes** both from the junior classes' vegetable plots and from the Year 10 Potato Experiment. The hot weather has returned to make this task arduous for those not used to physical work in high temperatures. It has been a very wet season and the weeds have taken full advantage of this and have been very competitive with other vegetables. Pastures are thriving and we are just waiting for a run of fine, sunny drying weather to cut **pasture hay** for next year. The cattle are in great condition and we are expecting a drop of calves early in the New Year.

The **hydroponics** area has produced a mixture of vegetables that I have been experimenting with, and the set up is great for growing seedlings- Celery, beetroot, lettuce have grown well to transplant size, and the latest trial is water cress which has not had enough time to prove itself yet.

By the time this newsletter goes to print, there should be **crayfish** in the two concrete tanks outside of the farm classroom. The farm hands have worked hard and creatively to set this system up. Homes for the yabbies to shelter under have been made too, with the assistance of the 9Ag1 class. The farm was able to make use of the offer of a water tank from the Government's Solar Schools Initiative. It has been positioned to catch rain water from the work shop and machinery sheds, and it can be run directly into the aquaculture tanks without the need for the water to be treated. Come down and have a look when you are next in the school.

An area of the **peach orchard** has been altered so that new peach trees can be espaliered onto wires. The idea is to make their care and protection from pests easier in the long term.

The **bee hives** which were moved away from the high traffic area near the poultry shed still need some work done to make their area more workable. The Bee-food garden which was created to provide all-season blossom for them is growing well, and starting to gain height and provide more shade in the area. The buddleia bushes have established well and provide a very pleasant honey smell as you walk past them. The Parramatta Amateur Beekeepers' Association has kindly donated two book vouchers for Awards Day, to go to Agriculture students who have shown iniative in practical Agriculture.

The **mulberry trees** which you may remember are outside the farm class room and beside the basket ball nets produced a massive crop in term 4 and students and the School community made good use of them for fresh eating and some jam making. The trees growing in the free-range poultry yards are also giving the layers tasty tree-fall treats and providing dense shade in the hotter months.

The **Zoo-food garden** in the North Eastern corner of the farm is starting to get established and thicken up and we hope before long that Taronga Zoo will be able to take a harvest of banana trees and mulberry leaves for their animals.

KATRINA BOLTON (1997)

Katrina won the "Radio feature, documentary or broadcast special" section of the 2011 Walkley Awards.

"Katrina Bolton, Radio Current Affairs Documentaries, ABC Radio, "Drink, death and dollars" Katrina Bolton's documentary takes us inside Central Australia's alcohol-related catastrophe. It asks to what extent the behaviour of businesses – particularly in relation to takeaway alcohol – is responsible for the appalling death rate.

The documentary shows the human side of Alice Springs' addiction to alcohol, introducing us not just to the drinkers but to their families and the people who care about them. It canvasses the indirect deaths, the pressure to keep drinking, and how powerless non-drinkers feel when pubs open every morning and then sell unlimited amounts of alcohol as soon as takeaway sales are legal.

Bolton found it very difficult to secure on-the-record interviews for this sensitive story, as many drinkers were ashamed, many non-drinkers were afraid, and many of the people she spoke to didn't have phones. She found one interviewee, Kevin Wirri, by riding around Alice Springs' town camps on a borrowed bicycle.

The story sparked a Northern Territory Licensing Commission review of the way the venues operate, and retailers in the Alice have since committed to a floor price, taking the cheapest alcohol off the market.

Katrina Bolton has been working for the ABC since 2001, for the past six years in the Northern Territory. This is the second time she has been a Walkley finalist. "Drink, death and dollars" won a bronze in international competition at this year's New York Festival.

Judges' comments:

Katrina Bolton braved the wild bars and takeaways of Alice springs – where the drinking begins early and usually end in violence – to give us an insight into an important issue, in a story which provoked a public outcry. Through natural sound and interviews, Bolton's feature highlights not just the tragic extent of this persistent problem but also the role of the liquor suppliers who continue to fuel it.
